Foreign Language: The minimum requirement may be met in high school by completing 3 units of a single foreign or classical language credit or American Sign Language credit. The requirement may also be met by one of the following before or after transfer admission:
Those who have taken 2 years of a single foreign language in high school can complete the 1106 equivalent course at their current college in the same language as taken in high school or by taking the 1106 course at Virginia Tech.

• Students who have not completed two units of a single foreign language in high school MUST earn six credit semester hours of college-level foreign or classical language credit (ex: 1105-1106). These six credit hours are in addition to the 120 credit hours required for graduation.
